One-Pager Independent Reading Assignment Directions

When you have finished your independent reading books, complete a *One-Pager* for each book read. Remember, the *One-Pager* assignment will demonstrate your understanding of the books to your teacher and classmates.

A *One-Pager* is a way of responding to a book on one piece of paper. It represents your own written and graphic interpretation of what you have read.

Directions:

\Box Must be on standard sized (8 ½ x 11), unlined paper.
☐ Should be in final draft using pens, colored pencils or markers.
☐ Write your name, date, and period number on the back.
□ Be creative and thoughtful.
☐ Arrange the following elements on the page in any way you choose (ALL are required for full points):

- Arrange the following elements on the page in any way you choose (ALL are required for full points)
 - 1. Title and author of the book.
 - 2. A one-paragraph summary of the plot. Must address exposition, rising action, climax, falling action, and resolution.
 - 3. Name(s) and brief description(s) of the main character(s).
 - 4. Describe the setting; time, place, social conditions, atmosphere (note whether these elements change or don't).
 - 5. From the novel, include two vocabulary words with definitions and illustrations. Choose words from the book that were unfamiliar to you. Include the page number where each word is found.
 - 6. Include two significant excerpts from the book quotes or passages that are important to the story. Include the page number where each quote is found.
 - 8. Have at least one graphic representation: a drawing, magazine picture, or computer graphic that relates to the book you read and the quotes you chose.
 - 9. Rate your book one five stars and explain why you gave it that rating.

In addition:

Fill the entire page (very little white space left showing).

Writing must be in blue or black ink, **no pencil**. If your One-Pager lacks one or more elements, seems to be put together with very little effort, or is otherwise poorly done, you may have it returned to you to do over.

One Pagers will be due during the first week of school. You will turn these in to your ELA teacher. Students enrolled in Accelerated Language Arts in 7th and 8th grade should be ready to take a test on the Greek and Latin roots during that first week as well.
